



### Can homeless people care for their pets? A Santa Fe controversy points to solutions.



Journalist Michael Benanav contacted Karen Cain and SHAP after seeing social media explode with accusations of dog abuse by one of our SHAP clients. Despite the fact these targeted claims were proved factually inaccurate, misleading, and false by Animal Control and Police, a group of online vigilantes apparently banned together in a heartless, misguided plan to steal Chris's dog, Desi. On Saturday, May 17 of this year, we saw unabashed online ranting and plotting . . . then the worst happened . . .

later that very same day Desi was abducted. It was obvious Chris and Desi were stalked by individuals because of the info they shared about them online. SHAP and supporters have been searching for Desi since May with the help of local police. Chris remains devastated . . . Desi had been his faithful companion for over 6 years.

Michael traveled with Karen around the city on several occasions, as she assisted those on the Street, to see and assess the situation for himself. This article focuses on many aspects of homelessness in Santa Fe and especially those living on the Street with companion animals. It explores the social media threads that deliberately target and malign our homeless. Nothing is ever black and white on the Street. Jumping to conclusions or even intentionally making false accusations seems to have gotten traction in our community. Everyone on the street is not a drug abuser or mentally ill, although certain members of the public lump all homeless into one of these categories to fit their narratives for stealing their dogs.

Several of our SHAP families have been specific targets of vigilante men and women this year here in Santa Fe. All accusations investigated by SHAP, veterinarians, Animal Control, and the Santa Fe Police were found to be baseless.

We can't stop the maliciousness in the hearts of folks. We can try to educate . . . prove their allegations are not true . . . but some folks only see life as black & white . . . and the very visibility of the homeless makes them targets of malicious, online "gangs" that carry their rants from the socials to actual illegal actions on the Street. Experts say abuse and neglect are more rampant in housed folks than people know, but rarely will they be reported.

It was something I'd wanted to do for a very long time because as a huge animal lover, it pained me to see homeless families without the resources they needed to take care of their pets. To say that my experiences this past year have been rewarding would be a massive understatement.

During this time, I've helped countless families with food, shelter, and medical care for their pets. I've become friends with many of our clients and been on the receiving end of countless happy kisses from their pets. While outreach is normally relatively uneventful, sometimes there are heartbreak moments, such as when I had to escort a client and his incredibly ill puppy to the vet to ensure her survival. ## ROBERT and KAI

### Robert and Kai

**RIP Kai ~ Feb 14, 2010 to Feb 28, 2025**

“Kaila Jane McGillapuppy” (Kai for short) and her guardian Robert had been together for 15 devoted years. Sweet Kai, known as a “Santa Fe icon”, was often seen posing for photos in over-sized sunglasses. Kai passed away earlier this year. She was a beautiful, gentle soul, and loved Robert unconditionally, just as he loved her. Kai’s caring SHAP Street Team deeply misses her too.

In her final months, Kai suffered from kidney failure and was finally taken from this world on February 28, 2025 . . . and, from the loving arms of her grief-stricken Dad. While she’s over the Rainbow Bridge now, Robert still misses her desperately every day. Kai was family . . . this “gentle ole girl” was his everything. Homeless folks with companion animals don’t have much while living on the Street . . . but they know what’s important . . . what’s valuable . . . the absolute love between them and their companion.

SHAP lovingly supported Kai and Robert since about 2012 – helping them with veterinary care, food, and supplies through the years. They were family to SHAP. We continue to stay in touch with Robert and see his sadness still lingering. Nothing can ease this kind of loss. Fifteen years together . . . but it still seemed so short a time to contain this much love.



### Robert’s Tribute to his beloved Kai *In his own words*

“I was the fourth companion by the time I got her at 4 months old. We knew right there, as soon as we met, it was going to be for life. She held up to her end of the deal and her man daddy held up his end.

I knew Kai was beyond a special animal -- she had so much depth. In fact, so much I never actually had to teach her very much. Kaila Jane McGillapuppy, as I would lovingly call her, made the cover of 4 magazines, was on Food Network twice, made Travel Channel’s BEST OF episode, and multiple other publications all over the country. We couldn’t go anywhere without Kai being the center of conversation with her trademark sunglasses and never being on a leash. She was a star that knew how to carry herself in public,

I would always tell her to ALWAYS “be a lady” and she never let her fans down. As well as always wanting everyone and everything to be her friend, she was in the movie *Odd Thomas* made here in Santa Fe and understood 6 languages, English, Spanish, Danish, Mojave, sign language, and the not so subtle, Hobo. She only barked probably seven times in 15 yrs, so that really was helpful in having an extreme bond with her. I almost had to read her mind -- she would not vocalize her intentions.

A huge part of me died when Kai passed. I will never be the same man I was. I became a hollow shell with no reason whatsoever to live. Everything I was got ripped right out my soul that night.

Kai is the only one that could possibly understand my hurt. You’ll always be my Kaikai. My daughter. I pray we will be able to join spirits soon like we did in life.

I miss you baby.”





Sometimes Love Has No Address

On Nov 16, I met up with Karen at **Amelia White Park**, and as I approached her, she immediately began to love on me like a sister, ask me how I'm doing, tell me how good it is to see me, and all at once I feel welcome in her presence, seen, heard, and valid. This visit in the park is about **Santa Fe Girl Scout Troop 10777**, arriving to meet with us, to learn about **SHAP** and why this work is so important.



**Karen** explained to the young girls, who listened intently and curiously, about people and their companion animals living outdoors with little to no resources, and what **SHAP** does to make sure the **companion animals** and their person are supplied with everything they need to be okay. . . such as food, harnesses, blankets, coats, food/water bowls, vet appointments, immunizations, and regular check-ins and more. **Karen passed the opportunity to speak over to me** asking if I would share a little about my companion animal and what **SHAP** has done.



**Upon agreeing to do this**, I thought it'd be easy, just tell them how **Karen** helped me so much, however when I began to speak and explain how I'd met Karen my heart welled up all at once, and my whole body flooded with emotions as the files in my memory jogged back 14 years to when I'd first called on Karen. Desperate, cold, clinging to last hopes, my beloved companion, an 80 lb. pitbull named **Mama**. I was broken, hungry, homeless. Aged out of foster care. . . an adult body with a desperate child's mind and a girl's broken heart. Karen shared love and kindness all those years ago. When I stayed in hotel rooms trying to survive, Mama and I, Karen didn't judge. She bought Mama big bags of kibble, a harness, and a chew toy, called her sweet baby, and showed me that we were worth loving. **Years after Mama passed at 12 years old**, Karen helped me again, this time with **Olivia**. She never judged or asked why are you homeless again? **She just asked how can I help, and this is what I can do.**

I shared my story with the young **Girl Scouts** and their leaders, and thanked Karen for all of the years of selfless unconditional love she'd shared with my beloved companions. I explained how much it meant and what a huge difference it made.

**Karen asked the girls** if any of them would like to share. What I heard next, forever expanded my heart and knowledge of love. The girls each began to express one by one the huge gratitude and love they had for their own pets and how important it was to them to help the people and pets less fortunate than themselves. **Some expressed experiences of being homeless**, living in hotels with family, or having parents, and close relatives who'd experienced being homeless.

**They huddled around with what they called a spiderweb hug** to support those who tearfully and courageously spoke the truth of experiencing homelessness, and at the end dedicated themselves to work as a team to create something nice for people and pets living outdoors. **Karen reminded them that they are our future**, and they truly seemed to understand. Their little hearts just overflowing with love, compassion, and great ideas for this world. I was so blessed and honored to be invited to see just what happens when Karen creates links with love. **SHAP is more than a life link, it's a love link** for companion animals and their owners alike, linking love everywhere with everyone!

*I love you Karen, so very, very much. You are my hero forever!*
